The last year has been extremely busy for the club with the most new members joining in a

single year that I can remember, a multitude of improvements around the club including new carpet, roller shutters and the repainting of the interior. Look forward to the improvements planned for next year and hope all the members assist where they can on these.

Boat Hire

During a recent blustery wintery day I had the opportunity to fish one of the competitions out of the club boat with our president Dave.

A challenging session due to the poor weather limiting where we could fish it was still a relatively successful trip, where we both managed to weigh fish in.

One of the benefits of fishing with a club is the access to information, friendship and sometimes equipment such as a club boat.

This is a great asset for a club in that it allows members who have neither the means, storage or inclination to own their own boat ready access to one. The process for hiring the boat is easy, just speak to Garry our boat captain and he will book you in and advise you on the hire conditions and costs.

You don't even have to hire the boat to fish in an angling club competition. So next time you are considering an extended trip to the seaside, then consider taking along the club boat.

For the club to own and maintain such an asset carries a degree of cost, so if members do not take advantage of the opportunity to use the boat then we run the risk that it will no longer be viable to keep it.



17 January 2016 Hastings/Corinella, Westernport Bay (Whiting 1)

Still, hot conditions provided near perfect boating conditions for the first whiting comp of the year, and we had 15 members fish all parts of the Port for a modest to reasonable return of 32 fish. A couple of members got onto decent numbers of fish, but that meant there were a number of members who only weighed in very small numbers of fish whilst a few were unlucky to miss out altogether. I know that Bucko and I fished the Coronet Bay, an area that Bucko knows like the back of his hand, and despite being on the water well before the sun was up, we still only managed a very modest return of 1 fish each.

Port Phillip Bay (Whiting 3)

The early forecast for the PPB whiting comp looked really promising, but as the actual day drew closer, the forecast worsened, and we ended up with quite a strong westerly blowing for the best part of the day, and as we all know, a westerly makes fishing out of the Black Rock-Beaumaris area somewhat problematic. Accordingly, the "Yak" boys found the conditions too tough to get out in, and anyone planning to launch locally also erred on the side of safety and comfort and decided not to put their boat in. There were a few desperados though, who headed south, and fished around the moorings in the Sorrento-Portsea area. This not only proved to be relatively comfortable being out of the wind, but also yielded some decent returns on the fishing front, and certainly meant that we had some fish to weigh in back at the Clubhouse. The only comment I would make is that for those of us planning this journey again, make sure we leave enough time to get back to the Clubhouse!

So there were 4 members who weighed in a total of 13 fish, with Ax, who was fishing on Haystac, coming up trumps with 4 nice fish, with the heaviest coming in at over half a kilo being caught a few minutes before stumps were pulled and thus giving him maximum points. Haystac skipper, Phil, also weighed in 4 fish but they were not quite as heavy Alex's, whilst Sandy and Ron filled out the other positions between them. Poor Craig and Caroline put in the hard yards and made the long journey before sunrise, but couldn't jag one of the elusive KGs despite multiple shift on location and different techniques being tried.



Now we get to item 4, Dave's fishing report from our fisheries diaries......

Dave's Trip Report........... "On our annual social trip to Mallacoota this year, 11 members completed 7 survey diaries for the DPI. This report is a record of those diaries.

A minimum of three trips of two hours was required. This is a record only of the diaries. The members who kept diaries, and other members, may have fished on more occasions without keeping a record.

Sixteen members fished; there were six boats, four kayaks and some members fished from shore.

As bream were measured from nose to fork of tail, approximately 2cm can be added for total length. When estimating legal size fish, all bream 26cm and longer were considered legal. Flathead were measured overall.

Other species caught: Tailor, pinky snapper, trevally, flounder, mullet, sweep, herring, salmon, leather jacket, garden eel, rays and octopus.

Largest Flathead was 72 cm, caught by Ron Wilson.

- Largest Bream was 40 cm, caught by David Oates.
- Smallest capture recorded: Andres -12 cm sweep.

Weather was warm and boats were launched every day. Most days were fine, rain only one occasion and the wind was usually moderate. Temperatures mid to high 20s.

More flathead were caught this year and they were larger than last year.



Members will be saddened to hear of the passing of Henry Houben, known to all as Chooky.


Longer term members will remember Henry with affection.
