Sand Flathead Assessment

On Wednesday, 10th July, JB, Michael H and David C travelled to Queenscliff to attend a workshop conducted by the DPI. The subject was "Sand Flathead Stock Assessment in Port Phillip Bay". Other attendees included, representatives from Marine Parks, VRFish, private operators and recreational anglers. It was a good opportunity to meet the people who process our research.

The DPI presented charts and information to show the drastic decline of sand flathead stocks. Stocks of other species of flathead are considered healthier. Much of the data is obtained from regular trawls in various parts of the Bay, mostly on the eastern side.

Sand flathead were abundant up to the 1950s and commercially harvested. They declined gradually until 2000 when there was an 87% reduction to 2010. Since then numbers have stabilised.

Suggested reasons for the decline included weather patterns, changes in habitat, water quality and flow from the rivers and availability of food. Other reasons also include introduced species of plants and animals, disease and predation.

The general opinion of most at the workshop was that the Bay is in good condition, especially the southern end. We suggested it might not be so rosy in the north with the scarcity of formerly common species like gummies, couta, trevally, bay trout, etc.


As a bonus it was a sunny day in the middle of winter we enjoyed a very nice lunch in attractive surroundings overlooking a beautiful part of the Bay.

Planning for Recreational Boating

On Tuesday, 25th June, Mark H and David C attended a workshop on planning for recreational boating.

The workshop was conducted by the Central Coastal Board. The venue was Sails in Elwood, and they provided a very tasty lunch.

The workshop was attended by about 20 people representing fishing, boating, sailing clubs, as well as local government and private enterprise.

A recent audit of all boat ramps around Victoria had been undertaken. The SAC ramp had been missed, but has now been included. Other issues discussed included;

- The lack of boat ramps and parking
- No data on the demand on boating facilities
- Current planning hasn't considered future boating population changes or lifestyle changes (eg. kayaks & bigger boats).
- The lack of any protocols at boat ramps
- Multiple authorities to deal with regarding coastal issues

Meeting notes are to be provided by DEPI over the next few weeks.

I don't know if anything was achieved, but the people representing boating interests were adamant the facilities available at present are inadequate. The convenors should have enough material to keep them happy for a while.


Lake Tyers

(Estuary 1)

After last year's standout fishing



results at Lake Tyers, expectations were high amongst the Sandy Anglers of another great weekend's fishing. Once again a very healthy contingent made the journey to the east of Lakes Entrance on the Friday (and in some cases, early Saturday morning), and were greeted with spectacular winter fishing conditions on the Friday afternoon and Saturday.



Crisp mornings, clear skies and virtually not a breath of wind made for an idyllic setting. The preceding month's torrential rains meant the moth of the lake had opened for the first time in a year, resulting in a drop of roughly a metre in the water level of the lake overall which in itself created a few problems for a number of members (yours truly included) who decided to try their luck at mud ploughing at various times over the weekend.

However, with the mouth of the Lake open, the wise old local sages at the Pub on the Friday night told us that had caused many of the fish to try their luck out at sea for a while, meaning the fishing was extremely slow. And guess what-they weren't wrong.

Catching fish to weigh in proved to be an elusive task, with only Willow and Blackie troubling the scorer. Blackie persisted fishing in the main lake for the entire day, and was rewarded in the late morning with a 1.174kg bream – a truly beautiful fish. Willow ventured well up the top of the Nowa Nowa arm, and was fortunate to pull an almost 1kg bream out from under the snags to present at the weigh in. Numerous other fish were caught, but unfortunately were not of a size that could be weighed in. (Well most of them – isn't that right Dave C!). Phil's only success came in winning the Pub raffle, and proceeded to cook up his winning meat tray for breakfast for all members on the Sunday.

And in contrast to last year's season opening competition, there were numerous nominations for Paddle Awards, most of which will be held over until Presentation Night, but a special mention to Mark for his knot tying efforts when launching! Aaah – it's all good fun.


As for the fishing, conditions were very windy on the Saturday, making trolling for trout and salmon challenging. A new concept was trialled whereby the first day's weigh in was held at midday to enable those members who wanted to be on the water late in the day the opportunity to do so. And so it transpired that the theory worked well in practice, and proved instrumental in seeing passionate bait fisher, Ron Wilson, land a very nice brown trout late on the Saturday. Ron was targeting those areas that trout love to patrol late in the day, and floating a mudeye underneath a bubble float proved too tempting for a patrolling brown. Unfortunately for Ron his good form did not extend to

his beloved Magpies in their knockout final against Port Adelaide that night. Ron and a host of other Magpies supporters had to suffer the ignominy of a Collingwood defeat whilst watching on the big screen at the Camperdown Pub that night, whilst elsewhere Phil S was immersed in his IPad studying the latest election results across the Nation. The Sunday morning saw perfect conditions welcome all of those who decided to fish. Calm settled conditions made trolling significantly easier, but sadly the fish did not take the same view. Ronny had a pre-fish on Friday repeating last years' success at Bourke St on the Pondage. Ron was using his go to soft plastic (Black and Gold Squidgie Fish) and landed a nice 1kg+ Rainbow. Unfortunately he could not replicate this success for the rest of the weekend. He both trolled and bait fished using mudeyes but could raise a fish. You would have to go back quite a few competitions to not see a fish against Rons name.

The weather on Saturday was beautiful and sunny with little wind. The fishing on the other hand was not so kind. Only three people managed to weigh in fish on the Saturday. The first was JB with a thumping Brown trout of 2kg. Our angling Secretary having gone back through our records found that this is the heaviest trout weighed in for over a decade. A big congratulation to JB. For the record I believe that he landed it trolling.



The only other boat to have any luck was Fishinator. Peter weighed in a couple of small browns (approximately 1 kg) and Glen caught three trout for a bag of 2.3kg. Once again the trout were caught trolling and where caught around Coller Bay. Not keen to give away the secrets of his success, when asked at what depth he caught them in, Glen replied 'between 5 and 50m'. For others bait fishing or trolling it proved to be a frustrating day with very few bites. I fished the Eildon pond and Goulburn river and did not even see a fish rise. This was in contrast to last year where there were lots of river trout jumping. The water levels in both the

Pondage and Goulburn river were much lower than last year.

For a Saturday night feed the club enjoyed its traditional meal at the Eildon pub with a few drinks and plenty of food enjoyed by all.

This was enough for him to take out the Victory for the week end which is his second Freshwater competition win. A fantastic effort for a relative new comer to our club competitions.

Old Wives Tales

Under Pressure.

"1020 fish a plenty". This is a common saying I have come across during my internet surfing, and it reflects the strong belief that some people have that barometric pressure and having a high air pressure reading is a crucial factor to the success of a




days' fishing expedition. Is there any evidence that barometric pressure has significant impacts on fish behaviour and should you be paying more attention to it when deciding when to go out fishing?

What is Barometric Pressure.

Barometric pressure is the measure of the weight of the atmosphere (i.e the air) above us.

Measurement of barometric pressure is done with the use of an instrument called a barometer. This measures the weight of the atmosphere per unit area (which equates to a "pressure"). The airs weight is compared to the weight of a column of mercury.



The first barometric instrument was invented in 1643 by Evangelista Torricelli. His barometer used a glass tube from which all the air had been removed (i.e he created a vacuum) and then inserted it into a container of mercury that was exposed to the pressure of the air. The air pressing down on the mercury in the container forces an

amount of the mercury up into the glass tube. The height to which the mercury rises is directly proportional to the pressure of the atmosphere. This is usually measured in inches or mms of mercury.

Modern barometers use a pressure transducer. This transducer converts the amount of air pressure into a proportional electrical voltage. This voltage then can be fed into a digital readout.

Weather and Barometric Pressure.

In Australia barometric pressure is measured in hectaPascals (where 1hPa equals 100 Pascals).

The barometric pressure changes as the weather systems over us change. In general, low-pressure systems bring unstable conditions, often with clouds and rain. A rising barometer means high-pressure is approaching, usually bringing stable and clear skies. Air pressure readings at ground level typically range from 980 hPa to 1040 hPa

The following are the World Records for barometric pressure:-

- Lowest atmospheric pressure ever measured on Earth was 850 hPa (when adjusted to sea level), set on 24 June 2003, during a tornado in Manchester, South Dakota.
- Highest barometric pressure ever recorded on Earth was 1,085.7 hPa measured in Mongolia on 19 December 2001.


How to find & read Barometric Pressure:

Barometric pressure can be found on a synoptic weather chart and is displayed as an Isobar. These are lines on a weather map that join locations of equal air pressure. The number written on an isobaric line is the atmospheric pressure for that isobar (measured in hectaPascals). On weather maps, concentric isobars are usually drawn increasing or decreasing by an increment of 4 hPa. The lower the air pressure is, the more


likely the chance of an extreme weather event such as a cyclone.



So from the above synoptic chart you can see Melbourne has just experienced a high pressure system (and is at approximately 128 hPa, but the barometer will be falling as a low pressure system moves in. This could mean bad news on the angling front as the fish start to go off the bite.

How does Barometric Pressure impact on fish:-

One often quoted belief is that a falling and low barometer causes bad fishing and a rising and high barometer generally produces good fishing. There's plenty of theories why this happens but the most common myth is that it affects the fish's swim bladder. The claim is that the lower-air pressure causes the fishes' swim bladder to expand and makes the fish feel 'full', and so reduces their appetite, so they go off the bite.



Fish have a swim bladder containing a volume of gas, which they adjust to equal their environment. This enables most fish to comfortably make small and quick up or down movements in the water.

This theory at first may seem plausible because changing pressure has visible impacts on people. This is best seen when driving up and down mountains. Popping eardrums is one effect that most people encounter as the barometric pressure changes.

If you look at the situation from a fishes' perspective then the situation is slightly different. Just as there is barometric pressure for the air, there is also hydrostatic pressure under the water. And as water is much heavier than air you only have to go down 10m in the water to achieve 1000hPa of pressure (which is the whole weight of the earths' atmosphere). So moving up or down in just 1m of water (100hPa change) accounts the full range of possible air pressure variations. This 1m water variation is equivalent to the tidal variation in most of Port Phillip Bay (High to 1.4 to Low 0.2).

Fish experience changes in pressure in their everyday life that far outweigh anything atmospheric pressure can dish up. And the deeper it gets, the less it matters. Therefore expansion of a fishs' bladder due to atmospheric pressure variation would appear to not be an issue for fish.

So what other factors could help explain why fish appear to bite better on high atmospheric pressures. Here's a few other potential explanations.

Oxygen Levels:-

One theory is that fish are much more active and prone to feeding when the levels of oxygen in the water are higher. The lower the air pressure, the less able water becomes to absorb oxygen from the atmosphere.

Old Wives Tales:-

To add to this, aquatic plants, plankton and algae, are the main contributors to the dissolved oxygen (DO) content of water (particularly freshwater), as a by-product of photosynthesis. Plants take in CO2, and give off Oxygen. Photosynthesis slows down dramatically in the low light that usually accompanies a cloudy, low-pressure system. Also, rough conditions created by low-pressure storms cause the water to become cloudy and inhibit light penetration, slowing photosynthesis more.

The opposite is true with high pressure meaning more abundant sunlight with greater photosynthesis and more dissolved oxygen entering the water.

The PH of the water:-

Prolonged or rapid changes in pH (measure of acidity of the water) will also affect fishes' behaviour. pH levels of the water are impacted by the CO2 in the water. As CO2 levels increase, the pH of the water decreases (it becomes more acidic). During a sunny day aquatic plants remove CO2 from the water, which helps raise or at least stabilise pH. But during a cloudy day, when plants are photosynthesising less and using less CO2 the pH will drop. The amount and speed of pH drop will vary between waterways. This is a much greater issue in freshwater than in salt because the general hardness of saltwater makes its pH much more stable. This could explain why some people claim that freshwater fish are much more affected by low-pressure weather.

Water Temperature:-

It is generally know that water temperature significantly affects the metabolism of a fish and its desire to eat. Storms, commonly associated with low-pressure fronts, are known to break thermoclines in the water. This mixes the oxygen depleted colder water (from the deeper layer) with oxygenated warmer surface water. This results in lower oxygen levels above the thermocline, thus potentially reducing the activity levels of the fish.

So given that there are many possible explanations to explain why fish behaviour changes when the barometer changes it might be valid to argue that it is the actual weather conditions and its impact on Water temperature, oxygen levels and pH that is causing the changes in fish behaviour rather than just the change in barometric pressure impacting directly on the fish.


Other Factors influencing Fish Behaviour

It is also important to remember that there are many other factors besides barometric pressure that affect fish feeding habits. These include water temperature, light levels, tidal forces, water clarity, the pH level, water levels, wind/surface disturbance, boat traffic, fishing pressure and even the stages of the moon and sun.

Conclusion:-

With so many commitments in life I still find that I will plan a fishing trip around when an opportunity presents itself rather than based on factors such as barometric pressures or moon phases or tides. I do however think that it might be worthwhile to start taking note of barometric pressure and including its reading in any fishing diaries as a way of keeping track of its impacts on fishing success. This may help provide an extra motivation or reason to get out and fish when the barometric pressure is right.

Xmas is fast approaching. Are you looking for something for that fisho that has it all. This might be the thing that gives them the edge and might help bring home a feed of fish.



HOME MADE TUNA PIZZA

Has the weather stopped you from getting out to fish? Didn't have any luck on that last fishing excursion? Run out



of fish in the freezer, and have a hankering for some seafood? Don't despair here's a quick canned tuna recipe to soothe your rumbling belly.

Ingredients:-

- Medium Can of Tuna (in oil or springwater).
- Tomato paste.
- Onions (Thinly Sliced)
- Mushrooms & Capsicum(Thinly Sliced)
- Lebanese Bread or a Pre-made Pizza Base.
- Grated Cheese
- Pineapple (Optional).

Method:-

- Pre-Heat Pizza base / Lebanese bread in oven till toasty warm.
- Remove bread, spread tomato paste and return to oven for several minutes.
- Remove base from oven and add all ingredients (including tinned tuna). Return to oven to cook for several minutes.
- Remove base once again and sprinkle grated cheese over top. Return to oven until cheese has melted.
- Remove from oven, cut into wedges and serve.

If all this put in oven, take out of oven sounds too much like hard work then you might want to ring someone and just get one home delivered.



For this editions members rig Dave C. has generously dug into his past to recall and share his slightly unusual garfish rig.

This is an old and tried rig for gars. If you are a serious gar fisherman, give it a try.

Method:-

- Use wire for the hanger (lighter guage than coat hanger is probably better as it is easier to use.)
- Twist a loop at the top and turn over the ends to attach line.
- Suspend below a float as you would a single hook rig.
- No lead or sinker required.
- Bait hooks with a small piece of pilchard, silvery flech baits or dough.





Dave C also gained an honourable mention. At Lake Tyers, he had landed a nice bream.


