## **New Competition Rules: Photo Weigh In**

Fishing as a pastime has changed significantly in its attitudes to catching and then either keeping or releasing fish. To keep up with these changing times angling clubs have to go through a process of adaptation to make sure they keep pace with the current thinking. Some club members had expressed a desire to see some change in the way that we currently conduct weigh-ins and in particular receive recognition for fish captures that they wish to release. This was especially true for specific species such as bream. In response to these member questions the committee has had in depth discussion around this issue and has voted to introduce a method for anglers to enter a fish for weigh in via photographic proof. As part of these discussions it was also acknowledged that the weigh -ins and its associated BBQ's provided an important social and cultural aspect within the club and that any new rules introduced should not risk impacting participation numbers at these events. So as a compromise we have introduced the following additional clauses into the SAC's member rules.

## Rules for members wishing to submit images of released fish for competition points. (Updated November 2014.)

Member must personally attend at weigh-in and present images to weigh-master. Alternatively, another member may personally present the images he/she has taken on behalf of the member. Images sent to the weigh-master or to another person by the member are not acceptable for competition points.

Images of released fish must clearly identify the type of fish and the length of the fish to the satisfaction of the weigh-master. The onus is on the angler to provide a suitable ruler and image of the fish caught. It is preferable that each image will include the date. There is no limit on the number of images that may be presented to identify that member's catch.

There will be no calculation/estimation of the weight of eligible fish images for competition points. Images of each fish will be counted as "a fish" and ranked behind all fish that are physically weighed on the scales. Examples:

Where 3 anglers capture 1 fish each but only one angler weighs in, that angler will receive the higher points and be deemed to have caught the heaviest fish, regardless that the images of the other anglers' fish may show they are longer (or appear heavier). This applies also where members capture 2 fish, 3 fish etc., those member/s who submit images, rather than weighing in, will always be considered to have a lesser

"bag weight" and therefore receive the lower points.

Where 2 or more anglers submit images\* at the weigh-in and capture the same number of fish, the weigh master will give the higher points to the angler with the greatest combined length of fish. Eg.

Angler A two fish total weight = 1.24 Kg. Points 25

Angler  $B^*$  two fish total length = 59 cm Points 20

Angler  $C^*$  two fish total length = 56 cm Points 17

## Rules for members wishing to submit images of released fish for Gunboat or Kayaking points.

As <u>Kayaking points</u> only apply to the individual kayak angler the points are awarded as they apply for Competition points with points for images of captured fish always having a lesser value than weighed fish.

For <u>Gunboat Skipper points</u>, where all crew are club members, points will be awarded exactly as they apply for Competition points with points for images of captured fish always having a lesser value than weighed fish.

However where there is a crew member/s who is not a club member and that crew member submits images of captured and released fish for Gunboat Skipper points, the weigh master will reallocate points treating non-members as members for Gunboat skipper points with images of captured fish always having a lesser value than weighed fish. Eg. All weighed fish will be allocated points in declining order based on heaviest to lightest bag, following which points will be allocated in declining order based on longest to shortest total length of fish.

So next time you catch an "eligible" fish that you feel is too "small" and would not normally keep it, or alternatively catch a thumper that you want to experience the pleasure of seeing swim away then remember there is now the option to take a photo and bring it to the weigh in.

#### **Club Awards:-**

The angling club has long history and tradition which normally accrues to organisations that have been around for more than 76 years. During this time many trophies, shields and momentos for recognising the achievements of our club members exist. To get a good idea of how many (and the list, if there was one is large) then next time you are in the clubrooms take a look at the glass cabinets next to the bar. They are full of trophies and awards that date back a long time. One such award is the Heaviest Snapper Cup.

This cup is awarded to the angler that lands the heaviest snapper throughout the fishing year. That angler can then choose to proudly display the cup at home for the following year.



The original cup was donated by George and Joan Sank, of David Road, in 1959.

They operated Sanks Service Station at 233 Hampton St, Hampton, near Linacre Rd. As a guide to some of the names recorded on the cup we have the following list:-

1959/60 – the inaugural cup was won by R Rreloggen. It appears that the Treloggen family went on to dominate the trophy all throughout the 1960s and 1970s as R Trellogen went on to also win in 63/64 & 70/71. Also listed is M Treloggen whom has his or her name on the cup in 67/68, 68/69, 71/72, 73/74 and 75/76.

The 80's where dominated by L Anning whom won in 83/84, 86/87 & 87/88. The 90's proved to be a tougher decade as only one name appears as a multiple winner and that was J Lindholn in 96/97 & 98/99. What better person to come to the clubrooms and give a snapper presentation than someone with the proven success of having taken out multiple biggest snapper trophies.

Moving into the naughties starts to see some more familiar names and some current club members. For the record books I have listed all the winners since 2000.

#### **NEW SNAPPER SEASON FORMAT**

With the ongoing issues with availability of several boat ramps in our local area the committee decided to trial a one off change to the snapper season weigh-in format. Rather

than lines down on midnight Saturday it was decided to allow anglers the opportunity to fish from Friday evening all the way through to Sunday weigh in if they desired. This way hopefully missing some of the longer queues at the ramps. Also trialled was an opportunity for fisherfolk catching fish on Friday night or Saturday morning to weight their fish on Saturday afternoon. To ensure fairness for all fishers, it was decided that if the Sunday was a blow out then the whole week end would be determined as cancelled and no results would be registered. The approach that will be taken next snapper season will be decided by committee next year but please feel free to pass on any of your comments on this years' format to our Angling Secretary Ron.

## Club Fund Raiser – Bunnings BBQ

With the official Club barbeque not scheduled until May 2015, the committee decided to trial some additional fund raising activities and so we nominated to do a week day Bunnings BBQ.

At Holland's Landing, one of our country members, Mike Whelan, who lives at Phillip Island, was fishing with good friend, Phil S on Haystac and had a "purple patch" in Toms Creek whilst fishing with sandworms. In the space of an hour in the early afternoon, Mike landed no less than 4 good size fish over 30cm, an effort made even more meritorious by the fact that he had never actually previously targeted bream in his fishing endeavours. And those 4 fish - at a bag weight of 1.958 kgs were enough to see him gain maximum points and take out his first ever Sandy Anglers Fishing Comp. I should point out that yours truly did catch a number of fish during the same session, but all were just below size. Pity!!



A special mention must also be made of John Matheson's efforts. Not only did he also

weigh in 4 nice bream whilst fishing from the dock area at Holland's to snag second place on the podium, but it was John's efforts in making the journey to Nicholson to purchase some sandworms for many of those fishing which actually yielded some good results. All fish caught over the weekend were taken on worms, so thank you very much John. It almost seems a pity to mention about the flat battery, doesn't it John!! ② (OK, we'll leave that for another time!)



In third place was another relatively new member, Rob Kaldor, who fished with JB on Redgum and caught the weekend's best bream at .638 kgs. Well done Rob. All in all of the 11 members who fished, 7 weighed in over the two days, with Al Fairley coming from nowhere on the Saturday night to weigh in two fish on the Sunday and share 4th place.

And finally, we couldn't leave without making mention of the fantastic fire a number of our group had raging on the Friday night in the camping ground. 

Pre dawn starts are made extremely hard when you have made numerous trips on previous occasions and spent countless hours on the water all resulting in zero bites from snapper. Thankfully the twilight competition format meant that all angling club members could afford to have a welcome lie in. Unfortunately the change in format did not change the results, with once again only one snapper weighed in.

I had a fish with Dave Clark and we fished off Mordialloc, working our way from the 14m mark into the pinnacles and then out to the artificial reef for sunset. I set off for a sunrise start from Sorrento with Craig for a beautiful calm sunrise. We headed out past the channel onto a hole 6 to 8m deep hidden amongst the mud flats. The plan was for a bag of snapper, the result was a suitcase full of Port Jackson and Banjo sharks! At least in the lulls between sharks Craig managed to snare a lovely 50cm flathead which definitely punched well above its weight and had Craig thinking nice red, (if just for a moment). I also managed my first gummy, even if it was only an extremely modest size (1.8kg). We then moved in shallower for squid and whiting but once again only found rays, baby flathead, pinkies and lots of gurnards.



By early morning most of the other SAC boaters who were on the water experience strong gusty winds. At least the sun had some bite to it so there was no risk of getting cold. Dave and JB tried for some whiting, and found the fishing slow only managing a fish each. Ron and Terry on Willow searched long and hard for some whiting and were the only boat to get a quantity of their target species with Ron ended up with 4 whiting.



Jimmy tried his luck out in his yak, but the gusty and choppy conditions made kayaking difficult and slightly dangerous so he quickly called it quits. He did manage a small flathead which squeaked him into the points and allowed him to stay on top of the ladder.

Phil S and Bucko hit a purple patch chasing squid. They did well drifting across a patch of ground near Sorrento. Unfortunately the squid were not the kilo plus monsters, or else they would have filled out the winners list. Phil's 7 squid (that he kept for weigh in) was good enough for third place.

John M tried his luck off one of the peninsula jetties. He managed to snare a lovely kilogram sized salmon. Unfortunately it proved to be a costly salmon as he left his rods unattended whilst he answered the call of nature and on his return one of them was gone. He might have had a visit from the sharks and rays as well it appears?

First place was taken out by Andres (with a bag of 2.35kg). This was a very welcome victory as this was my first fish weighed in for what has been a very slow and frustrating season. Craig Waller was close behind with a bag of 2.13 kg. Craig finished the day happy, taking out the maximum 45 points available for the gunboat captains award.

Overall a relatively successful day with a total of 26 fish / cephalopods weighed in, covering

a wide variety of species from gummy to whiting, salmon and flathead. Even more impressive this was the first competition in a very long time where every angler that fished the event managed to weigh in at least one fish





#### **Arbor Knot**

With several members feeling the sting of being spooled by unknown pescatorial critters, I thought, what could I do to help alleviate further embarrassment? Well rather than a members rig I thought I would present a knot for this edition. This is the knot that I personally use to secure my line to the reel spool. Although I have never had the privelage of a fish screaming off and peeling enough line to reach the knot, at least I have the comfort of knowing it is there if ever I was to need it.



#### Method:-

Step 1. Wrap the tag eng of your line around your reel spool.

Step 2. Tie an overhand knot in the tag end. This will keep the end from pulling through the main knot. Tie another overhand knot with the line around the spool.

Step 3. Wet the main knot and pull it down tight onto the spool. Make sure the first overhand knot pulls in tight to this main knot.

For a more detailed instruction on how to tie this knot you can find plenty of instructional videos and diagrams on the internet.

## **Twanging the Twine**

They say that you can't believe everything you see on TV. Whilst trawling through the Channel 31 fishing shows I came across this little tip. I believe it was on OZ Fish TV and the presenter had hooked a stringray, which after a short run proceeded to lie stationary on the bottom. Having been in this position myself I find that no matter how long you apply full pressure the stingray won't be shifted off the bottom. In the end you get frustrated at the lost fishing time and the sore muscles and chose to end the deadlock by grabbing the line and pulling tight, usually ending in a lost rig. On the TV show the presenter proceeded to vigorously flick his line like he was plucking at a guitar string. After a few plucks the stingray got up off the bottom and started swimming again, allowing the fisho to reel it in. The theory as explained was that the vibrations of the plucked line must annoy the ray.

I though that I had the chance to test this theory whilst snapper fishing with Craig. He reeled in a rod which had plenty of weight and appeared to "run" only to come to a deadweight. Thinking classic stingray fight I told Craig about the theory and he proceeded to pluck away vigourous. Unfortunatley nothing changed. In he end Craig had to manually pull at the line whilst I reeled it in for him. A solid minutes fight later a rope appear quickly followed by a scaler bag and two bricks. Thankfully, the theory may still be true, so if you are in the position of actually hooking a ray, that sticks to the bottom give this a try and then let please me know if it really works.

#### **Snapper in Westernport:-**

On the 10<sup>th</sup> of October the club was pleased to welcome back past president John Lindholm. He gave a thoroughly enjoyable and informative presentation on fishing for snapper in Westernport. As an experienced charter skipper John has a lot of experience in the finding and catching of Snapper particularly in Western Port. He was generous with his time and some secrets in explaining the

different rigs to use and most importantly the usual migration pattern of snapper within WP giving angling club members some ideas to put into action for tracking down those elusive snapper this coming snapper season.


A bid welcome aboard and we hope you enjoy your time with the Angling club.


