AGM Secretary's Report

Thank you to all my colleagues on the Committee for their support over the year. And special thanks to Garry Meehan for all the administrative tasks he performs behind the scenes in his unheralded role as Assistant Secretary.

Once again, this past year has seen the Club's position strengthen with a 25% increase to our total membership which now stands at 122 up from 97 last season due largely to the increase in family memberships.

In regards to the next Committee, under our new Consumer Affairs Victoria's Model Rules, we can now use technology to communicate at meetings meaning that a member can contribute to a meeting via Skype, mobile phone, or by landline, etc. So the days of members not being able to join the Committee due to living too far away are now in the past. Therefore, all members now have the opportunity to step up and help out the Club by joining the Committee regardless of their location.

And finally, I continue to look forward to seeing the Club continue to grow over the next year and beyond.

AGM Treasurers Report

I am pleased to report that the club has ended the 2014 / 2015 financial year with a strong profit result. The club finished with a net accounting profit of \$3543 and when adjusted to a purely cash flow basis equates to a gain of \$3688.

The good profit result was assisted by the following factors, including:-

- This financial year we held two successful Bunning's BBQs. Apart from our usual Saturday BBQ we also trialled holding a smaller Thursday one. This raised nearly \$800 in profit. The Bunning's BBQ is the clubs major fundraising event so it is vitally important that all club members pitch in and help. I would like to extend my thanks to all who have helped in making this years' event successful, especially Steve Wilson for once again organising the BBQ.
- Subscriptions are stable, maintaining the strong result from the last two years.
- Bar takings remained solid. As one of our major sources of stable revenue I would like to thank all those members who give of their time during club nights to help serve behind the bar, especially our perennial bartender JB. Also a big thanks to Garry for keeping a tight rein on our drinks suppliers to help bring our bar expenses down from last year.

Even with the club in a good financial position, there are some issues with our expenses that will impact on the upcoming financial year's expenses. . The major issue is with our electricity supplier. An issue with the normal estimation of bill and incorrect billing from our supplier AGL has taken nearly 3 months to resolve. This has resulted in an electricity bill shortfall of approximately 3 months, therefore approximately \$900 of electricity charges that should have been expensed this year will be carried into next year's expenses.

On a personal note after 3 years of keeping the books I will be stepping down from the role of treasurer. I would like to thank the assistance of my fellow

committee members throughout these past years in handling payments, purchasing of club consumables and the prompt and efficient handling of receipts, especially since I have been absent for some periods of time throughout the year. It is these things that make the role of treasurer easier to execute.

Jeff Worle Trophy:

To continue with the theme of reporting on the history of our competition trophies I again want to focus on a snapper trophy. This time it is the Jeff Worle trophy.



It is traditionally the first snapper trophy up for grabs every snapper season and it has very special significance in the history of the club.

It is a trophy that was introduced by the club to honour and remember the sacrifice

of one of our young club members - Jeff Worle. Sadly with the passing of so much time, there are not many members remaining whom would have known Jeff. One member is Fred Bouyer who recalls Jeff as a strapping lad, over 6 feet tall who lived in the local area, loved his fishing and was very active around the club rooms.

Jeff was conscripted into the Army, and apparently was quite happy to serve in the army. Jeff sadly lost his life whilst on guard duty, serving his country during the Vietnam conflict.

Hampton PTE. Jeffrey Thomas Worle, 21, single of Bluff Rd., Hampton, was killed in action in Vietnam on Tuesday. He was killed when North Vietnamese Army regulars attacked fire-support base "Bal-moral," in Bien Hoa Province, early on Tues-Six Australians were wounded in the four-hour attack. 21, single, of Traralgon,

The trophy was created in his honour and some of the names prominent as winners include.

1968/69 the inaugural winner Roy Dewhurst, who was then followed in 69/70 by Alan Dewhurst

The seventies saw some multiple winners including M Trelloggen in 72/72 & 76/77, and our current life member Keith Turner taking out a double in 75/76 & 79/80.



18 January 2015 Hastings, Westernport Bay (Whiting 1)

7 members and 1 visitor shook off the holiday season excesses to go whiting fishing.

Fresh South Westerly winds made conditions a little difficult but this didn't stop the club venturing far and wide in an effort to find fish. Areas fished included the middle spit, Hastings channel inlet, Coronet Bay and the Corinella pier. There was a very short but hot bite session during the day and sadly if you missed it then the fishing proved to be extremely tough. First and second on the day was a family affair with Riley and John L weighing in 13 fish between them. You could argue as local ex charter skippers they had a serious home ground advantage. Craig landed 4 whiting for third. Jim managed a solitary whiting earning 16 valuable points to stay in touch on the leader board

01 February 2015 Hastings / Corinella Westernport Bay (Whiting 2)

The Westernport dual weigh in location was applied for this comp. This is a popular format that encourages our kayak contingent to fish the relatively safe and productive waters of Coronet Bay. Ten 10 members and 1 visitor fished and



the day started out threateningly with early showers and southerly winds of 15 - 20 knots. Not that the weather seems to worry people too much when fish are plentiful. An excellent weigh in of 38 fish (totalling 5.872kg) made it a very productive outing.



The fishing was so good that only one member did not contribute at the weigh in. For the record our resident whiting specialist Ronny won with a full bag of 10 at just over 2kg. Second was John M with 6 fish (1.342kg). Rounding out the placings was Jimmy whom opted to leave the yak at home and managed 7 fish for 0.958kg

21 – 22 Febraury 2015 Port Albert (Trailer Boat 4)

15 members made the trip east. A favourite with many club



members, as Port Albert always offers good opportunities to catch some gummies or the large local flathead.

The first day started out with a foggy morning, but developed into a hot humid day. This made a pleasant change from the previous year's gale force winds.



The excellent thing about Port Albert is that if the weather permits, then there is a great opportunity to manage some excellent catches.

This year lived up to that. The total weigh in was 62 fish with 24.5kg and approximately 8 different species ranging from flathead to gummies, snook, tailer, mullet and garfish varieties. One of the more mentionable catches was Michael Hollands' Garfish, which weighed in just under club record.

Since the demise of the local hotel, club members improvised with a shared meal. This year was a BBQ complete with healthy salad. Not surprisingly for a fishing club not a single fish was seared in anger.

The other satisfying thing for a newsletter editor about Port Albert is that always manages to cough up regular paddle award nominations.



This year's effort matched the quality of the fish weighed in. The paddle award nominations included.

Port Phillip Bay

For two seasons the PPB portion of the whiting season has come up short with few or no whiting weighed in. In an effort to change this fortune the competition was moved from the usual January date. Stable weather, reports of good whiting catches in the bay were all positive signs leading up to the competition. Sadly the end result was the same as previous years.



14 members fished, predominantly around the Sandringham to Beaumaris inshore reefs. Sadly these produced only one whiting. Craig and Andres fishing off Walleroo tried something

different and launched out of Altona for a sunrise fish. A long fishing session did see a nice mixed bag of fish caught. Thankfully there were five whiting in amongst that bag which was good enough to give Craig the victory (3 fish for 650 grams) and second for Andres with two fish at 546 grams. Rob K finished in third with a solitary whiting.



I was also personally pleased, landing my first ever zebra fish. Oh well PPB whiting has let us down once again. Next season this comp is scheduled for February. Hopefully another different month might bring a better result

14-21 March 2015

Mallacoota Inlet (Social Week)



Mallacoota social

week is one of my favourite trips of the year. It is my one real chance to land an impressive Dusky, dream of a Mulloway or maybe catch a thumping bream. In reality it is just an excuse to relax and fish for a whole week in a relatively calm, beautiful and tranquil environment.

Unfortunately this year some family commitments meant I had to travel down midweek and also returned earlier than desired. This meant I did not cross paths with too many of the Sandi Anglers in my travels, and so their misadventures may go unreported.

The long road trip this year was made even longer with stretches of road-works and controlled burns on the last kilometres before the Mallacoota turnoff. This burning off would unfortunately go on to spoil on one of my planned morning assaults of the narrows. After

having hyped up the narrows as a must fish "hot spot" I had convinced Bob, Andrew and Garry to join me on an early morning session to hit the deep water off the banks with soft plastics. The cold an drizzly morning didn't deter us, but sadly the large "do not enter" sign across the track did. A quick investigation confirmed flames licking all the way down to the water's edge, from a controlled burn.

Why do I love Mallacoota so much, hopefully I can answer it with one of my more memorable fishing sessions of the trip.

I was fishing off the Karbethong Jetty. It was sunrise, I had just got a bite and was fighting a nice medium sized bream. I had managed to finesse it to within netting distance before it managed to take some line, dived under the jetty and busted me off. Oh well I thought I'll have another crack. I re-rigged, dropped the bait literally under the jetty and within seconds was hooked up. I once again set the hook and the fish dove straight under the jetty and quickly busted me off. I decided to serious then, tied on a 15 pound leader, locked the drag and dropped the bait. Again I saw my line move off so set the hook. A short hectic tussle ended in the same result. Leader shredded,



fish gone. Attempt 4, reminded me of an old quote..... "The definition of madness is when you repeat something over and over, exactly the same way and expect to get a different result".........Fish number 4 was also again quickly lost under the jetty. Sadly, just as quickly as the action has started the fish then went off the bite. Bream 4 Angler 0.

It is the fact that I now have 365 days to stew over this drubbing and can plan on how I am going to get my revenge that will motivate me to return. Not only will I have a date with the narrows but a sunrise or two on the Karbethong jetty now has my name on it.



Sadly I don't have too many fishing reports from other members that did the trip this year, but I can recount a couple of the non fishing happenings.

Ron and Terry fished out of "Willow" and decided to have a rod throwing competition.

Terry led off by casting at some snags. Unfortunately he did not hang on to his rod hard enough and it sailed off into the sunset. He went on to show off his angling prowess by casting his spare rod and managed to hook and then recover his original rod.

Ron, ever competitive was not to be out done, he got his own opportunity later when a bream allegedly snatched his rod clean out of the holder into the drink. Encouraged by Terry's earlier success he also cast out a second rod and amazingly managed to recover the rod. Shame his luck eventually ran out when he managed to snap the top off his favourite rod when catching it on the canopy during a cast.

Anecdotally talking to some of the shore based guys the fishing this year was generally slower than previous years, and I found that fish sizes were also down. To get a better idea on actual fish catches David Clark, once again generously organised the fisheries, log books and compiled the results from the diaries.

Dave Clark.....

This report is a record of the seven diaries I received and John Bentley and Peter Brown shared a diary. A minimum of three trips of two hours was required. This is a record only of the diaries. These members and others may have fished on more occasions without keeping a record. Eighteen members fished, seven boats only, the rest from boats, kayaks and shore.

As bream were measured from nose to fork of tail, approximately 2cm can be added for total length. When estimating legal size fish, all bream 26cm and longer were considered legal.

Weather was variable and boats were launched every day. Most days were fine, rain on only two occasions and the wind usually strengthened around midday. Temperatures were in the low to high 20s.


Results showed that fewer flathead were caught this year and they were smaller than last year. More bream were caught this year and they were larger than last year.

Some of the more noteworthy catches were,

- Largest Flathead was 55 cm caught by Dave Clark.
- Largest Bream was 38 cm caught by Michael Holland.
- Smallest capture recorded: John Bentley or Peter Brown – flounder 12 cm.

Other species caught: Tailor, pinky snapper, trevally, flounder, luderick and mullet.

12 April 2015

A calm start to the day, but quickly blew up to 15 knot South Easterlies. This meant it was much more comfortable fishing early on in the day.

12 members and 4 visitors fished the day, and a strong kayak contingent was to have a successful day. All three "yakkers" launched and fished from the eastern side and this proved a successful tactic taking out first, third and fourth positions.

The variety and quality of fish available out of Westernport is fantastic and this makes these comps always well attended. This competition was extremely successful with 49 fish weighed in.



The variety probably tops any competition the club held recently. The bag included the usual suspects such as Whiting, Squid and flathead, but also included some of the not so regularly weighed in species like couta and Elephant fish.

Greg did not disappoint managing to catch and weigh in his now customary leatherjacket. As a guide to how good the fishing was today, many of the clubs best captures for the year came from this competition.



For the records, Dave from his yak went on to edge out Craig with a full bag of 10 fish at 7.985kg. This was only 600grams better than Craig whom also managed a 10 bagger. A distant third was Greg with a still respectable 3.83kg and a full bag. I will guarantee that some of these ended up in the smoker.

(Surf 3)

Another foul wintery blast greeted the 11 competitors for the Mornington Peninsula surf comp.

According to some of these anglers, this was some of the most unpleasant weather that the club had fished in many seasons. The one thing that you can guarantee on a beach when you mix strong winds and sand is a lot of sand in a lot of unplanned places. In fact everybody's gear by the end of the day was thoroughly covered by the gritty stuff.

Add to this some swell and weed, really made the day very unpleasant.

The results also mirrored the day. A slow day resulted in only 5 fish being weighed in. Winner Craig

weighed in three of those, with a nice 1kg heaviest fish. Dave Clark and JB shared the remaining positions with 1 fish each.

And by all reports Craig had such a large lead in the surf competitions that he even had the luxury of practicing catch and release on some of the salmon he had caught. It's just a shame that he had already gilled and gutted them as a rogue wave tipped his esky over and washed away some of his days catch. A worthy paddle nomination to Craig, but sadly in a year when everyone else is losing rods and reels, losing a few fish I suspect would not be enough to get his name on that shield.

The forecast strong winds meant that this competition was cancelled the night before. To all our club members this is a sombre reminder that you should always fish safely and only fish to your level of comfort, skill and the capabilities of your equipment.

13-14 June 2015

Lake Tyers

(Estuary 2)

Is Lake Tyers on its last legs?

Continual week-end forays down past East Gippsland for the last few seasons have sadly produced smaller and smaller returns. At least this year the tight race for the leader board encouraged a few members to attend or risk being overrun for the top position. Oh well there is always next year, or is there?





The snapper season rule changes to cater for the boat ramp crisis last season will again be in force this season. As a recap, anglers have the opportunity to fish from Friday evening all the way through to the Sunday weigh-in time. To ensure fairness for all fishers, if the Sunday is determined to be a blow out then the whole week end would be judged as being cancelled and no results would be registered. If there is a blow there is always the opportunity for us to sneak in a well needed club rooms working bee.

GREGS' SMOKED FISH

Earlier this year at a Tuesday night social meeting we had an informative session presented by keen fish smoker — Greg. He provided us all with valuable insight into some of the techniques and equipment needed for getting the best out of you fish catch. I have attached the presentation material he prepared and handed out on the night, including some mouth watering photos of his own smoked fish Hopefully this will inspire some of us to try smoking some fish this season.

Basic Requirements

- Stainless Steel Fish Smoker \$50.00
- Smoker Sawdust (200 gms) \$5.00
- Methylated Spirits (1 litre) \$5.00

Optional Requirements

- Brine (500 mls water, 2 Tbsp salt, 1.5 Tbsp brown sugar)
- Seasoning (salt, pepper, garlic, lemon juice, spices, etc.)
- Other (Paper towel, aluminium foil, long matches, cutlery)







Some of the gear that will help you get started


Method

- Soak a whole fish or some fillets in a brine of 500mls water, 2 Tbsp salt and 1.5 Tbsp brown sugar for 30 minutes to an hour
- Pat dry then season with salt, pepper, garlic, lemon juice and spices.
- Place a small handful of scattered wood shavings on some aluminium foil on the base of the smoker, fill and light the Metho burner and place under the smoker.
- Place fish on the bottom rack of the smoker, pop on the lid and allow the fish to smoke for 15-20 mins. Then move the smoker off the flame for a further 5 mins.

Once done, any skin will just peel off, the fish will easily separate off the bone, and the flesh will be moist and succulent. And the smoky taste will be unbelievable!Enjoy

Brining:

Gives the fish that nice salty flavour you get with smoked fish and the sugar helps the smoke flavour to adhere to the fish. Brining also assists in leeching any blood and excess moisture out of the fish.

Some prefer no brine, instead just brushing a marinade such as oyster sauce etc. over the fillet.

Benefits:

Portability, easy to clean and store. Produces tasty, succulent healthy food without the addition of oils & fats.

Storage:

There is no need to scrub the inside with abrasive pads as the gradual build-up of smoke actually improves, rather than detracts, from the flavour of the food. Simply remove any food particles and residues from the metal surfaces and periodically wipe the inside and outside of the smoker with a damp cloth.

Other uses:

A Fish Smoker can also be used to impart that superb smoky flavour to many meats, poultry and vegetables.

Sample smoking times:

Whole fish, e.g. pan-sized Pinkie Snapper, rissoles 1.25 cm thick, 20 mins (15 mins over flame):

Fish fillets, marinated skewered prawns (top rack), chicken breasts, 500g chicken fillets, rissoles 1cm thick, rack of lamb, 70g sirloin, lamb chops, pork chops, sausages, lamb kebabs (top rack), small tomatoes halved and seasoned placed cut side up on a sheet of aluminium foil, garlic heads halved, potatoes peeled & sliced, small mushrooms.


15 mins (10 mins over flame):

Tuna steaks, 2cm thick - will be pink in the centre.

Summary:

Whole fish - smoke for 20 mins over the flame then smoke for another 5 mins off the flame.

Fish fillets - smoke for 15 mins over the flame then smoke for another 5 mins off the flame.

It is with great sadness that we advise of the passing of long term and highly regarded member Ralph Doddrell.

On 22 April 2002 whilst fishing in a SAC estuary competition Ralph decided the flooded Mitchell river mouth was the place to find fish and consequently set a new Black Bream record of 1.710kg that remains unbeaten today.
