

Club Fishing Reports:-

14-15 July 2012 Hollands Landing (Estuary 1)

Heavy rains and extensive flooding throughout much of



the Gippsland Lakes system in June instilled a sense of trepidation amongst the hardy troupe from the Sandy Anglers who ventured east for the first competition of the new season.

The initial fears about flood damage to caravans and cabins proved unfounded, as the newly raised cabins proved to be out of the reach of the encroaching flood waters (just!). However, the effects on the fishing were still being felt with the result being only 2 bream being caught by Club members the entire weekend.



JB and Bucko targeted the upper reaches of the McLelland Straits on the Saturday, and although sharpening their angling skills on light tackle, the only catches were large quantities of carp and the occasional eel. What these results showed was that the fresh water was still prevalent throughout the entire water table and as such, was not going to yield many (if any at all) bream.

Others went further afield, including across to Loch Sport and, of course, the age old favourite of Tom's Creek. Sadly, there was no joy on the fishing front. The only fish caught on the Saturday was done so very late in the day by veteran kayaker, Dave Oates, who managed to hook and net a nice 650g bream just prior to dusk. Everyone else had a good time, but rued the lack of angling action.

The Sunday morning saw the wind blow up, making life tough for the kayak contingent who had made the journey to Hollands. For those who decided to fish, Toms Creek was the only option given the strength of the wind. Showing that his recent good form in estuary fishing was no fluke, Bucko landed a very nice 1kg bream to take out the competition ahead of Dave Oates.

A wonderful BBQ feast was had on the Saturday, and in spite of the loud and unruly behaviour of a volatile group from Rosedale, everyone from the Club seemed to enjoy themselves.

4 August 2012 – Wonthaggi to Woolamai (Surf 1)

Reasonable weather for the angling clubs first surf competition for the new syllabus. Seven members fished the competition and they mostly fished Williamson's and Woolamai.

A brisk westerly and a bit of weed made fishing conditions a little tough and no eligible fish where weighed in.

Club Fishing Reports:-

19 August 2012 – Gunnamatta Beach (Surf 2)

Reasonable weather with no wind was a good omen for the angling clubs second surf competition for the season. Once again seven members fished the competition and two groups formed with one fishing near the car park of the surf life saving club and the second fishing 500m further to the left along the beach.

For the group fishing left on the beach it proved a winning tactic as all caught fish. For the group near the SLS car park it was a fishless outing. All fish were caught on the mid to high tide on either pilchards or surf poppers.



Congratulations to Phil on taking out the day with a full bag of 10 Salmon totalling 5.36kg with a nice respectable salmon of 1.274kg as his biggest fish. Ron came in a close second with 7 salmon and Steve was the final person to weigh in fish with 3 salmon.



1-2 September 2012 Western District Lakes (Freshwater 1)

Conditions were perfect on the Saturday, no wind and



the hottest day in a long time. Most of the club fished Lake Bullen Merri, and it proved to be very quiet. "Redgum" got some action early, with JB pulling a nice 850g brown up from the depths trolling a Tassie devil. He lost an even bigger one by the boat soon after.

Steve and Dave trolled every inch of the lake in their kayaks for no return. There appeared to be little on the sounder or fish on the surface compared to usual. Willow, Deb and Little Lachie (away on his first SAC competition), bait-fished for zilch also. Andres fished off the shore at Lake Purrumbeete and landed a small redfin (200g) on a soft plastic minnow

Club Fishing Reports:-

Jimmy appeared to be the smart one of the club, not venturing far from the ramp, sitting on the bank in the sun with a camp fire by his side. He managed a couple of undersized salmon and a few zzz's.

The locals all ventured out for dusk on Saturday as we all headed in after a long day. This appears to be the best tactic here as we heard they did well. But after a long day out on the water, a shower, a counter-meal and the footy were calling us all in.

Sunday was a repeat for most of us except this time at Lake Purrumbete. Andres fished of Hoses rocks and caught a nice 800g brown trout again on soft plastic minnow. JB caught another trout (580g) trolling, to knock off Andre and take the honours for the weekend.

Sunday was a lot windier, and by weigh-in time it was howling. Certainly made for a hairy ride back to the boat for Dave our only Kayak competitor.

Old Wives Tales

Who brought the banana..

One club member recently told of a fishing comp last season where a relatively new member was fishing out of his boat without any success. Whilst bemoaning the fact that the fishing was very slow and it just wasn't his day he proceeded to get his lunch out of his bag which included



a lovely ripe yellow banana. For many boat owners this would have resulted in an immediate removal of the offending fruit and maybe even the passenger from the boat. A quick search on the internet shows many charter companies in Victoria prominently display on their websites that they are a "Banana Free Boat".

So just where does the strongly held superstition of bananas being bad luck on a fishing boat come from. Well not surprisingly as with most superstitions the true origins are unknown and the historical justifications are many and widespread. Here are just a few.

- From Hawaii came this idea: "Hawaiian men would go out in dugout canoes and fish for weeks at a time.
 They would always take Bananas. By chance it happens that the bananas would rot about the same time they would get too far out to really catch any fish. So they associated bananas as bad luck.
- Many stories tell of banana oil rubbing off on ones hands and "spooking" the fish; therefore the fish don't bite.



- In old times, ships kept citrus on board to prevent scurvy. Bananas give off a gas that speeds up the ripening time of fruits. Thus, having bananas on board shortened the spoilage time of the necessary citrus stores, so bananas became a no-no.
- Some say that bananas give you the runs so you are always in the marine head and can't catch fish because you are busy "draining the pipes".
- In the days of sailing ships bananas would be picked up on tropical islands during the voyage. Living in these bunches of bananas would be all types of unpleasant insects and snakes, the worst of which was a species of spider whose bite could cause death. Captains would spread the notion that bananas were bad luck to keep these vermin off the ship.
- The wooden sailing boats of the Caribbean trade of the 1700s. had to move quickly to deliver bananas before they spoiled, and fishermen had a hard time trolling for fish on such fast-moving boats
- One of the creepier superstitions is that banana cargo could actually kill a man.
 Fermenting bananas give off methane gas, which could conceivably get trapped below deck and kill any crew members unlucky enough to be working in the hold

If you're not the superstitious type and still want to enjoy a banana on your next fishing trip that is not squashed or blemished from carrying it in your fishing bag then this may be the product for you.



Its called the Nude food movers, banana mover. Check it out on the net.

A Taste of the Sea.

As fashion, tastes and trends always seem to come in cycles, and what was old is now new I thought it would only be fitting to revisit an old recipe printed way back in the January 1991 edition of the Angling News. With the

addition of some modern culinary touches of course.

Back in the 1991 edition this was titled "JB's favourite fish recipe" and 21 years on I believe it still is.

Ingredients:-

- One 1.5 kg snapper (although any fish species is a suitable substitute).
- Two crushed cloves of Garlic.
- Olive Oil (1 Teaspoon)
- Sea Salt and Cracked Black Pepper.
- Continental Parley (for Garnish)
- Two 150g Eye Fillets

Method:-

- Marinate eye fillet with half the crushed garlic and olive oil and let sit in refrigerator to marinate for at least 30 mins.
- Place the Eye fillets onto BBQ hotplate and whilst cooking brush both sides with remaining garlic and add sea salt and cracked pepper to taste.
- Remove fillet when done to your taste add parsley on top for garnish and serve with a salad and chips.
- Give the fish to a neighbour or friend.

Members Rig:-(2 Hook Dropshot)

- ✓ Not fully converted to the latest soft plastic revolution "or fad as some may call it".
- ✓ Addicted to using bait on your fishing trips.
- ✓ Can't be bothered forking out your hard earned on a packet of jig heads that'll probably end up at the back of your tackle box.
- ✓ Like to try soft plastics but can't be bothered with the constant casting and retrieving. Then why don't you hedge your bets with a combination soft plastic dropshot rig.



Method:-

- ➤ Rig any bait on your bottom dropper and a soft plastic (preferably fast action plastic) on the top hook.
- > Sit the rod in the holder and wait for the bites.
